4 Main views on what happens when we die:

1. **Nothing** - you cease to exist
2. **Oneness** - your energy joins the earth with those who died before you
3. **Reincarnation** - either higher or lower in species and status depending on how you lived your current life
4. **Eternity** - judgement followed by heaven or hell. Or a Universalist approach that heaven is for everyone regardless

For the sake of argument, let's imagine that Christianity is not the product of any culture but is actually the transcultural truth of God. If that were the case we would expect that it would contradict and offend every human culture at some point, because human cultures are ever-changing and imperfect. If Christianity were the truth it would have to be offending and correcting your thinking at some place. Maybe this is the place, the Christian doctrine of divine judgement.

Isn't the idea of hell intolerant?

- What do we expect from God? Affirmation of all our choices?
- Is it intolerant to say that something is wrong?
- If God is as holy as the sun is hot (or even more so) does it make him intolerant to say that we cannot come close to him as we are?
- Especially if that would result in our destruction anyway?

How could a loving God allow hell to exist?

- Would it be more loving to let people get away with their sins and crimes?
How, then, do you define what love is?
- Do you think you deserve judgement? Why/Why not?
- Isn't it actually a loving thing to allow hell and yet provide a means to escape it?

Don't all good people go to heaven?

- Where's the line to ensure you're good enough for heaven or bad enough for hell? How do you know?
- The Bible says none of us are good enough. What do you think about that?
- Can Jesus really be the only way to heaven (John 14:6)?

Jesus met the standards heaven required, and paid the punishment that hell demands - so that we don't have to.

But isn't heaven boring?

- How could being with the person who created the Universe be boring? Won't it be loving, creative, dynamic and exciting?
- The Bible teaches there will be a new heaven and a new earth, plus new bodies, so plenty to be excited about! (Revelation 21)

Luke 13:22-30 (NIV)

Then Jesus went through the towns and villages, teaching as he made his way to Jerusalem. Someone asked him, "Lord, are only a few people going to be saved?"

He said to them, "Make every effort to enter through the narrow door, because many, I tell you, will try to enter and will not be able to. Once the owner of the house gets up and closes the door, you will stand outside knocking and pleading, 'Sir, open the door for us.'
